My father came to Haileybury by boat in 1906. He had been hired at that time to drive horses freighting for A. J. Murphy. He worked at numerous jobs for Government. Logging at Elk Lake. Mr. Murphy purchased the land in Lorraine Township which was all bush at this time and my father and oldest brother cut fire wood which they hauled on an old trail road into Haileybury for the brickyard where Mr. Murphy had a share with three other men. They cleared the land and was later known as the murphy farm.

When the rest of the family came in 1908 we stayed at my fathers sisters Mrs. Thomas Lemon My father had bought land on Lowler street which was all bush. We boys cleared the land and we built a house that yr and we lived there till the 1922 fire and after we rebuilt a home on Albert Street.

In 1910 I worked for Max Felly who had a wood yard Cecil Street then worked at the livery stable for Mac McLarry on Main Street. Then drove horses for Joseph Farmer working for the Town of Haileybury in 1914.

17. I tried to enlist in Haileybury in 1914 and they turned my down as I was not old enough. My brother had joined in North Bay he came home for a weekend and he said go to the Bay and tell them you are older. I did this and went in the 75 Battalion. I trained in Toronto and went overseas trained for a while in England then went to France and was wounded in my right shoulder came back to England and returned to Toronto 1919 got my dischar

This camp was quite clean. I recieved \$1.00 a day for six days including room and board.
